

**AGGREGATE DATA REGARDING THE NUMBER OF DEATHS, INJURIES AND  
SUBSTANTIATED ABUSE IN A CHILD CARE SETTING**

**OCTOBER 1, 2017 - SEPTEMBER 30, 2018 (Federal Fiscal Year 2018)**

The State of Alaska Child Care Licensing 7 AAC 57 and Child Care Assistance Program 7 AAC 41 regulations require all licensed child care facilities and exempt providers to report injuries requiring medical attention. Medical attention is defined as attention by medical personnel outside of the child care premises. Exempt providers include Approved Non Relative, Approved Relative, and In-home. The State of Alaska has defined “serious injury” as the following:

- Injury requiring surgery, excluding stitches;
- Injury requiring admittance to hospital;
- Choking or unexpected breathing problems;
- Unconsciousness;
- Concussion;
- Poisoning;
- Medication overdose;
- Broken bone;
- Severe head or neck injury;
- Chemical ingestion or contact in eye(s), mouth, or skin;
- Severe burn;
- Allergic reaction requiring administration of Epi-Pen; and
- Seizures.

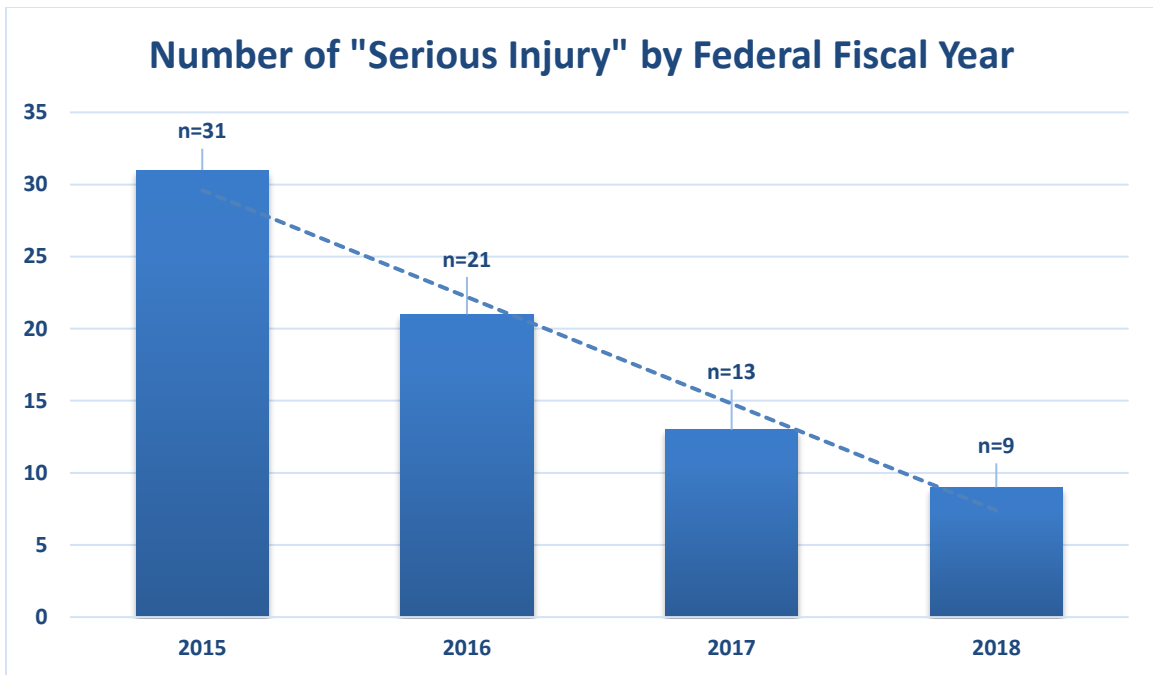

In Federal Fiscal Year 2018 (FFY18), out of an average total of 524 child care facilities with a total potential capacity of at least 17,764 children, there were 53 reported injuries statewide in a child care facility. Of the total 53 reported injuries statewide, 9 (17%) injuries were defined as a “serious injury” requiring medical attention.

**OCTOBER 1, 2016 - SEPTEMBER 30, 2017 (Federal Fiscal Year 2017)**

The State of Alaska Child Care Licensing 7 AAC 57 and Child Care Assistance Program 7 AAC 41 regulations require all licensed child care facilities and exempt providers to report injuries requiring medical attention. Medical attention is defined as attention by medical personnel outside of the child care premises. Exempt providers include Approved Non Relative, Approved Relative, and In-home. The State of Alaska has defined “serious injury” as the following:

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- Poisoning;
- Medication overdose;
- Broken bone;
- Severe head or neck injury;
- Chemical ingestion or contact in eye(s), mouth, or skin;
- Severe burn;
- Allergic reaction requiring administration of Epi-Pen; and
- Seizures.

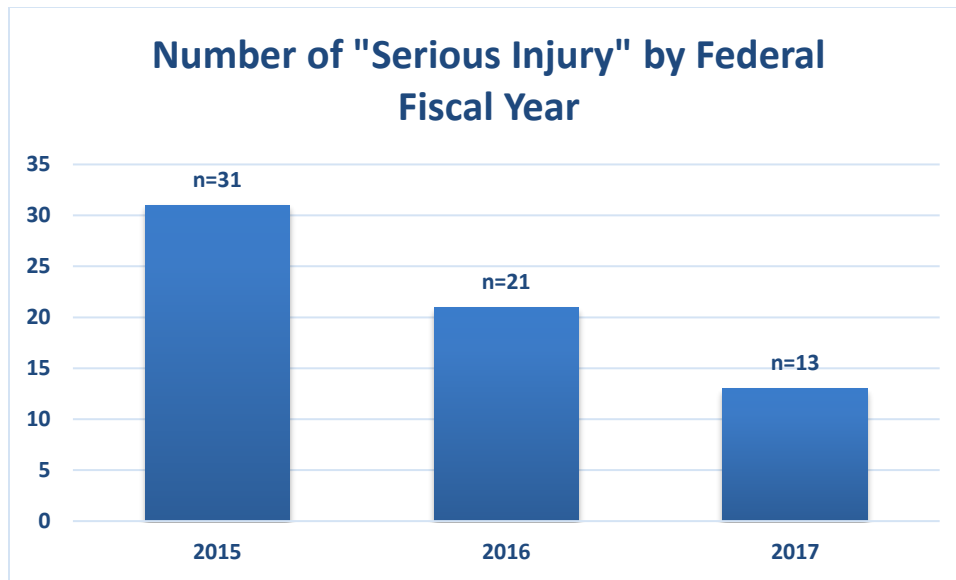

Medical attention is defined as attention by medical personnel outside of the child care premises. Exempt providers include Approved Non Relative, Approved Relative, and In-home. The State of Alaska has defined “serious injury” as the following:

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- Medication overdose;
- Broken bone;
- Severe head or neck injury;
- Chemical ingestion or contact in eye(s), mouth, or skin;
- Severe burn;
- Allergic reaction requiring administration of Epi-Pen; and
- Seizures.

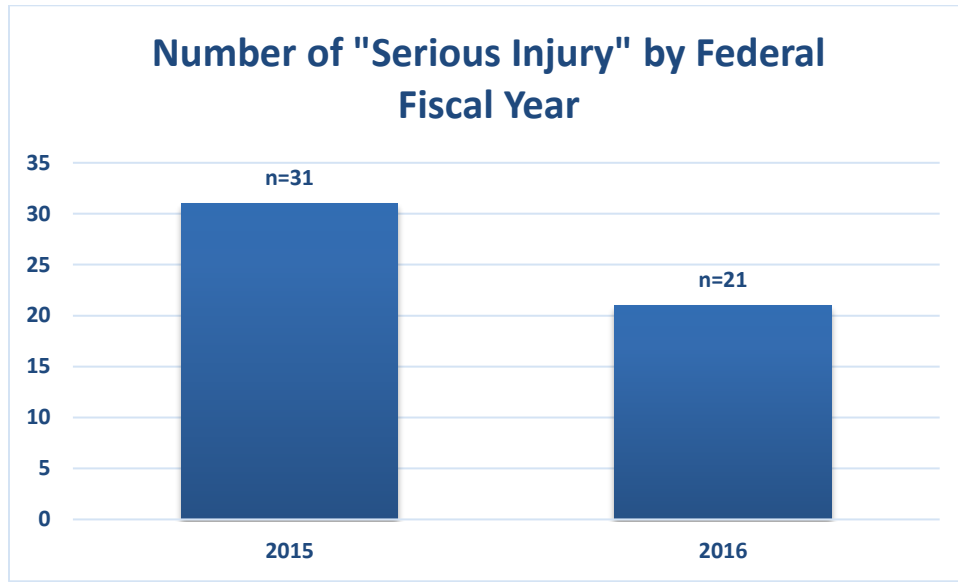

Of the total 78 reported injuries statewide, 21 (27%) injuries were defined as a “serious injury” requiring medical attention.*
